Lesson Content

What is Government?

Government is a system of rules and institutions that a society creates to organize itself, make decisions, and manage resources. Every country has a government, but governments can be organized in different ways.

Why Do We Need Government?

Governments serve several key purposes:

- Establish order and security: Create laws and enforce them to maintain peace
- Provide services: Build infrastructure (roads, schools, hospitals), manage utilities
- Protect rights: Ensure citizens have freedoms and protections
- Manage resources: Collect taxes and distribute public funds
- Represent the people: Make decisions that reflect what citizens want
